Strict holistic methods are employed to produce these organic farm products. **For information, membership & delivery fees Contact: John Castro at (516) 353-8668.** Unlike conventional farming which can use chemical pesticides, fertilizers, and herbicides, holistic grazing imitates the original big-herd migrations that once dominated our country's grasslands and brings life back to damaged ecosystems. Pasture rotation prevents over-grazing and maintains plant strength. The trampling of grasses reincorporates organic matter into the soil without disrupting the fragile microbial ecosystem. Organic matter is de-composed into new soil and fertilizer, replacing chemicals used on conventional farms.

## Updating Underground Sprinkler Control Units

In 2017, Long Island pumped more than 150 billion gallons of water from our aquifers. A large portion was used to water lawns and gardens. “Over-watering” is a common problem and a large percentage of this water is also wasted, due in part to older sprinkler control units that use pre-set timer functions. Although some systems have optional outside rain gauges that end cycles, this type of sensor is very basic and cannot respond to weather conditions.

Modern underground control units use the internet to oversee set programs of watering cycles. Control apps can be downloaded to a cell phone. However, the real benefit of these new systems is the potential for enormous water savings.

“Smarter Watering” occurs when a new unit automatically adjusts the controller’s watering schedule according to local weather reports. The controller calculates past and predicted rainfall and adjusts watering times. The savings accrue on an environmental and financial basis, via lower use of water and lower water bills.

You can contact your irrigation professional to inquire about upgrading your sprinkler control unit. You can also “do-it-yourself”, as most specialty retailers offer equipment (\$100-\$350), depending on programming complexity and system requirements.
