## **MAYOR'S MESSAGE**

I write to update you on the June 1, 2021- May 31, 2022 Budget, and additional items of interest.

#### **BUDGET**

After extensive scrutiny and detailed review by Trustees, Department Heads and Village Accountants, we presented a budget in the amount of \$8,860,827. Highlights are as follows:

**Tax Levy:** The increase in the Village tax levy, reflected in the operating budget, is 1.14%. The Village has realized a decrease in assessed value of 0.44% (0.0044) as a result of tax grievances. As in past years a portion of the Village's surplus will be utilized to balance the budget.

*Tax Rate*: For the 2021/2022 fiscal year the tax rate will increase 1.59% from \$46.48 to \$47.21.

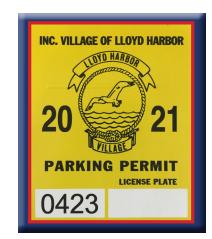
*Employee Benefits:* This expense represents 25% of the 2021/22 general fund budget, a decrease of 1.7% from the prior fiscal year. Retirees are included in this number. The Village's payment for Hospital & Medical Insurance will decrease 10.8% due to retirements and retirees becoming eligible for Medicare coverage. The Village budget for the NYS Employees Retirement System payment has increased 9.4% (\$15,000), and the Police Retirement System payment will increase 13% (\$60,000.)

#### VILLAGE PARK

PLEASE NOTE! Parking permit stickers are required on all cars entering the Park. As a matter of routine the LHPD will run the plates on any unstickered cars. If the car is registered in the Village the resident will be asked to purchase a sticker. Tickets will be issued to any vehicles not registered to a resident of the Village. Parking permit stickers can now be purchased daily at the Park Gate, or at the Village Hall.

Residents should know that, subsequent to the pandemic, traffic in the Village has increased dramatically. Vehicle entrants to Caumsett State Park alone have gone from roughly 500,000 annually to almost 1,000,000. The Village is home to a



Huntington Town beach, Federal Wildlife Preserve, several clubs, historic sites, the CSH Laboratory's Banbury Center and the Seminary. For collective security it is important that we be able to identify the non-resident vehicles that may be in our Village. In addition to Village Park sticker protocol, plate readers have been installed on entrance roads to the Village.

## **LEGAL MATTERS**

1) Town of Huntington – Suit pertaining to Town attempt to control Village waterways

I am very pleased to report that the Villages of Lloyd Harbor and Huntington Bay have prevailed in their lawsuit against the Town of Huntington's ill- advised attempt to pass legislation pre-empting long-established Village sovereignty over waters within 1,500 feet of Village shorelines.

Astoundingly, this legislation had full support of Councilmen Ed Smyth, Gene Cook, and Supervisor Chad Lupinacci. None of them bothered to familiarize themselves with NYS Navigational Law and several NYS Attorneys General opinions supporting the Villages' position. Furthermore, they failed to recognize the fact that Lloyd Harbor Village's incorporated limits actually extend 1,500 feet offshore.



#### LEGAL MATTERS CONT'D

Despite the Villages' best efforts the Town remained intractable in its claim that the Town owned the underwater land, and was therefore entitled to govern moorings in Village waterways. The new law was to be effective December 31, 2020. In early December 2020, the Villages brought suit against the Town to protect Village interests and jurisdiction. The Judge immediately issued a temporary restraining order on the Town of Huntington, preventing the Town from issuing mooring permits. An underwater title search was subsequently authorized by the Lloyd Harbor Board of Trustees. The title search revealed that the Village owns all 210 acres of bottomlands under our mooring fields.

A stipulation of settlement fully favorable to the Villages was signed on June 16, 2021, and the action discontinued. As a result the following will occur:

- \* Town Code will be amended to acknowledge Village's jurisdiction to place moorings in waters within Village jurisdiction;
- \* Town Code will be amended to exempt from its mooring regulations tax lots that constitute underwater lands within Lloyd Harbor (roughly 210 acres.);
- \* Town will NOT issue mooring permits for applications seeking to place moorings in Lloyd Harbor waters;
- \* Town's mooring applications will contain language regarding jurisdiction of various Villages within the Town, and include map showing where Town moorings can and cannot be placed.

# 2) 31 FO, LLC. – Commercial use of residential property

**Background:** In the fall of 2019, the purchasers of 31 Fort Hill Drive (31 FO, LLC.) unilaterally decided to hold a large commercial event advertised on social media, and designed to attract hundreds of people and their vehicles to this residential area.

As a result of Village resistance to the planned event the owners of 31 FO, LLC. commenced a lawsuit against the Village, asserting their right to use the property for commercial event purposes. I am pleased to report that, as a result of vigorous and protracted defense by the Village, this lawsuit has been dismissed in its entirety.
