HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT



During Hurricane Ida (9/1-2) and the extreme weather (tornado) following, the **Highway Dep't** in conjunction with the LHPD opened all blocked roads and worked with contractor *Looks Great* on continued emergency storm clearance.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

- "RAVE" The Lloyd Harbor Emergency Notification is operational effective January 2022. Registration envelopes are available at Village Hall.
- Safety Checkpoints & Plate Readers In order to assure Village security the LHPD is conducting routine safety checks during nighttime hours. As well, license plate readers are being installed at all entrances to the Village. The current climate of lack of enforcement New York State, NYC and many cities nationwide has led to record homicide rates and an increase in lesser crimes. The Village is, therefore, fully committed to deterrence.
- Car Keys & Fobs Do NOT leave these items in your car. There has been only one stolen car in the Village in the past year, which was quickly recovered by the LHPD. However, keys & fobs left overnight in open, parked cars account for the vast majority of car thefts along the North Shore.

• Mail -The mail theft issues that plagued the North Shore during summer 2021 have been stopped in our Village, largely due to the efforts of the LHPD. However, residents should continue to be vigilant as follows:

- * Pick up mail daily
- * Inform the LHPD of any suspicious activity (Tel: 631-549-8220)
- * Inform the USPS if mail of financial consequence is taken. Contact US Postal Service Police Bobby Moerler: 516-228-7676

- **Deer** The deer population is again on a big uptick. Activity is highest at dawn & dusk. Be vigilant, watch roadsides for "doe herds" & group crossings; use high beams to see ahead; try not to swerve, but hit brakes firmly & use horn if possible. Animals can be easily confused & move toward vehicle rather than away. Swerving your car can have serious adverse results.





HARBOR CONTROL COMMISSION

The Village has almost 20 miles of shoreline with active harbors on both the Huntington and Cold Spring Harbor sides. The Commission has done excellent and needed re-structuring of Harbor protocol and patrol activity.

A few highlights:

- * All Harbor Patrol staff are Peace Officers
- * Mooring permits: Available at Village Hall. Stickers must be displayed on both boats & mooring balls
- * Resident permits: \$50 (includes 1 guest)
- * Non- Resident permits: \$300 with up to 2 Associates at \$50 each
- * Clubs: \$1,100 (up to 10 boats on a Club raft-up.) must be flown.

Help Prevent Lyme Disease By: John F. Barone


2021 was another year of growth for Lyme disease cases in the United States, the majority of which were found here in the northeast. Conditions for the ticks that transmit the disease to humans, dogs and horses have been almost perfect over the past three years. Media articles continue to drive home the need to be careful when outdoors. A new Lyme disease vaccine currently in development may be ready for human trials in 2024. Meanwhile, there are several steps you can take to reduce possibility of contracting this potentially very serious disease.

2021 was a banner year for acorns- a "mast year". Oak trees dropped larger than normal amounts of acorns – up to 10,000 per tree! More acorns mean more deer, more mice and more ticks... and potentially more Lyme disease. Bagging and disposing of acorns is very helpful. An old way of controlling field mice is now much easier with the new generation of simple setup protective kits. Called "tick control tubes" they are similar to the cardboard tube you find at the end of your bathroom tissue roll. The tubes are packed with Permethrin treated cotton balls - an environmentally friendly, target-specific insecticide that kills ticks.

Placed 10 yards apart, and about a yard from the edge of your lawn, these tubes help control the ticks that feed on field mice. The mice take the cotton balls back to their living areas for use as nesting material. Ticks die from exposure to the treated cotton balls. Applications should be done in early April and early July. Be sure to follow product instructions.

Please consider removing your acorn waste, and using tick control tubes this spring and summer. It can really help lessen the impact of Lyme disease in the Village and protect both people and pets.

*Harbor Use (Mooring) Permits: Available Mon. - Fri. at Village Hall. Motorized watercraft using Village Park ramp need Harbor Use permit. Resident Fee- \$50.

*Dinghy/Kayak Racks: Fee - \$40. Permit applications available online at www.lloydharbor.org & at Village Hall. Maximum 2 permits/family due to high demand.

HISTORY HIGHLIGHTS

Van Wyck-Lefferts Tide Mill Sanctuary PO Box 1481 • Huntington NY 11743

2021 was a year of exciting restoration for this 18th century tidal gristmill! A \$97,000 matching grant from the Gardiner Foundation & over \$100,000 from neighbors & friends allowed master timber framers to replace/repair beams, rafters, roof & collar ties and floorboards. The entire structure was squared up & a new cedar shingle roof is being laid atop a high-tech snow & ice shield. The dam's surface was restored to its original design height & contoured to allow for run- off.



Some major discoveries:

What appeared to be a lift for the waterwheel turned out to be an upside-down cider press! Original wooden gears thought to be inoperable were made to interlock & turn. A late 1700's swivel crane was lubricated to lift & reposition the original grain hopper – exactly as a miller would have done in the 18th century!

Looking ahead:

- Repair & rearmor the bulkhead protecting the Mill;
- Identify the grasses & plants for top of the dam that can best withstand frequent salt water over- topping;
- Invite the public to view this wonderful window into 18th century life!





The Van Wyck-Lefferts Mill is the best preserved 18th century tidal gristmill in the United States. **Design is based on U.S.Patent** #3 for an automated mill, signed by President George Washington.
