

Dogs & Electric Fencing

The Village continues to receive a number of complaints regarding electric fences running right along the roadside, allowing dogs to harass walkers, joggers and people pushing baby carriages. We have heard from a number of people who are afraid to walk down certain roads due to menacing dogs. It is easy for a determined pet to break through an electric fence, and equally as easy for a fence to be broken or a collar to have a dead battery. Injuries to pedestrians and to the dog can result. In response to this situation, the Trustees are considering requiring setbacks for electric fences. As with any ordinance, residents will be notified as to any effective date.



Boards & Commissions

Positions Available on the Following:

• Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA)

The BZA meets on a regular basis, the 4th Wednesday of the month, at 6:30 pm. The BZA is charged with hearing applications for code variances and related issues.

• Harbor Control Commission

The Harbor Control Commission meets periodically during the season, beginning late winter and is active through early fall. The Village has 19 miles of shoreline. The Harbor Control Commission is responsible for patrolling these waterways, and interfaces with Harbor Masters in Huntington and surrounding villages.


RAIN GARDEN

The Lloyd Harbor Conservation Board has presented a plan to the Trustees for design and construction of an environmentally friendly "rain garden". A suitable location is to be determined.

Rain gardens provide a beautiful, economical and effective way to help manage stormwater run-off. Essentially capturing rainwater at its source, rain gardens reduce or eliminate the need for costly dry wells. They also virtually eliminate most of the toxic chemicals and pollutants that can threaten our ground and surface waters. Additionally, rain gardens promote aquifer recharge, which is becoming a major concern for Long Island residents.

As permeable soil is paved over for roads, buildings, driveways and patios, the opportunity for run-off of higher volumes of stormwater and reduced aquifer recharge is created. Stormwater can become contaminated by mixing with road surface lubricants and other household chemicals; nitrogen, phosphorous from fertilizer, pesticides and herbicides.

Lloyd Harbor Residents may have the impression that water is sufficiently absorbed by their expansive lawns. Unfortunately, this is not entirely accurate. The soil on most lawns is quite compacted and differs greatly from the more permeable soil that is maintained in a more natural setting. The dirt in which lawns grow typically becomes rather compacted and repellent of water, particularly during heavier rain events. Due to evaporation, stormwater run-off into our bays and harbors, and water taken up by plants, only a small percentage of rain water actually reaches the aquifer. A presentation about Rain Gardens will take place this Spring.



How a rain garden functions:

- 1. Capture run-off from road, driveway, sidewalk, or rooftop.
 - 2. Slow & reduce run-off.
- 3. Infiltration to recharge aquifer.
- 4. Deer resistant plants; deep roots to loosen soil, speed water removal and prevent insects.
